Singh talks of his Appalachian trek


It's 2,184 miles long, it took 23 years for him to finish walking it, and **Tony Singh** told us a bit about his 3-weeks-per-year hike along the Appalachian Trail at the April 18 meeting.

Since Singh took his first step on the trail in 1988 at Springer Mountain, Ga., it has taken virtually the lifetime of his daughter **Lisa** – who will graduate this



spring from the University of Iowa and join his Merrill Lynch Group full time – for him to reach Mt. Katahdin, Maine. Along the way, he learned a great deal about the trail (finished in 1937), the characters of the woods, terrain and people of the 14 states it passes through – and about himself.

"I always had too much," said Singh, who emigrated from Lahore, India, as a young man. "We all do. I never feel vulnerable." But on the trail, he continued, one is "fully exposed to the



elements and often out of touch" by cell phone. "But if you're ever in trouble and need help," he observed, "you always get it" from the people who walk the trail and those who live nearby. So, one of the lessons Singh learned was "to let go of possessions" – carrying everything he needed in a backpack.

Another lesson learned: the importance of "paying it forward" – from fellow hikers helping each other on the trail to the volunteers along the way who work to maintain the condition of the trail.

The full impact of Tony Singh's trek eludes the reader of these words. But BRC members got some further hints while viewing the photos he took – from close-ups of wildflowers and tiny lizards to scenes around some of the 262 lean-to shelters that dot the route to the vast scenery viewed from atop mountain ridges in New Hampshire. He is one of only 12,000 hikers who have experienced the trail's full length over its 75-year history; "about 80% who start it never finish it all," Singh said. [TIP: Miss the meeting? Watch for one of Singh's Appalachian Trail presentations.]

McGimpsey began to distribute tickets – which are hot off the presses.




