### Learn how Vera French Center meets mental health needs of the QC

The Vera French Center is actually a consortium of three non-profit organizations: the Vera French Community Mental Health Center, Vera French Housing and the Vera French Foundation. At the May 14 meeting we'll have an opportunity to learn more about how it helps members of the QC community who experience mental illness – which affects 1 in 10 children and 1 in 4 adults in the United States.

Studies show that mental illness is treatable, allowing people to recover and move forward with their lives, according to the Vera French Web site. For those who are impacted by serious and persistent mental illness, treatment offers opportunities to manage symptoms and maintain quality of life.

Scott County Mental Health Center was founded in 1949 and renamed in 1982.

## **Sheridan revives Dav. Jr. Theatre**

Six years ago, the Davenport Junior Theatre was stagnating with only about 30 students enrolled, and city officials were thinking of ending it.

Instead, they hired **Daniel Sheridan** as artistic director, and as performing arts supervisor for Davenport Parks and Recreation. Now the second oldest junior theater program in the United States (founded in 1951) is flourishing, with total enrollment in performing arts programs in the low thousands of teens and younger children from throughout the QC, according to Daniel.



As Daniel described it at the May 7 meeting, the performing arts program offers summer theatre courses - "theatre for kids, by kids" - in acting, improvisation, song, dance and musical theatre for actors ages 3-13+. "Spectrum Theatre" began as a

program for youth with conditions in the autism spectrum, but has expanded to teach key skills that are useful in theatre – or anywhere else in life – to kids with many special needs.

Week-long junior theatre camps flourish during the summer months. "The Show Must Go On" looks behind the scenes to teach youth all about how the theatre works. In "On the Road," they learn how performers through the centuries often had to travel to their next play. "Where Stories Began" explores the historical origins of live performance. The "Teen Intensive Camp" lets more advanced youth thespians "push themselves to the next level." Special performing arts camps during spring break and the summer give students the opportunity to "collaborate on the creation of their very own script" - and then perform it.

All of the theatre programs aim to help the youths who participate to improve their confidence, poise and theatre-related skills, such as movement and voiceprojection – and even acting exercises wearing masks. All camps and courses conclude with a performance that gives the participants an opportunity to apply what they have learned.

Although the Davenport Junior Theatre moved among some 30 performance venues during its early years, it now calls

the Nighswander Theatre on the Annie Wittenmyer Complex its home. For more information, call 563-326-7862 or

### Howard Buffett Wants To End Hunger By 2046

**Howard Buffett** is on deadline. In 2006. his father, U.S. investor and philanthropist Warren Buffett, challenged him to do something great in the world and gave him \$1 billion to do it. So he gave himself 40 years to spend every penny in a bold attempt to end global hunger. After a second stock gift in 2012 and favorable returns, he has about \$3 billion now. An Illinois farmer, Buffett spends part of the year in the cab of his tractor and the rest of his time leading the Howard G. Buffett Foundation. He's barreled headfirst into his task, visiting more than 100 countries to research the scope of the issue. So far, his work has funded research into drought-tolerant crops, supported the mapping of food insecurity in America, and will pull nearly 50,000 Central American farmers out of poverty.
