Transported into Viet War Hell...

When **Bill “Hawk” Albracht** launched into the narrative of what he and the men under his command endured at a jungle outpost in Vietnam in October of 1969, the room grew quiet. We seemed to forget that we were at a Rotary meeting in Bettendorf, Iowa, on Aug. 12, 2015. No one wanted to miss a word. We all were transported into the midst of a long-ago, far-away war.

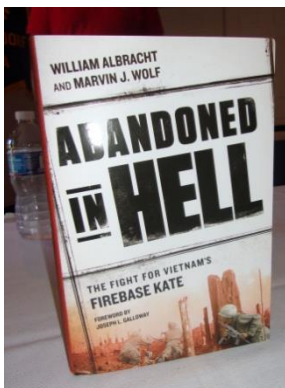
Bill set the stage masterfully: Just two years after joining the Army – and just two years after graduating from Alleman High School – he had completed Officer Candidate School, been commissioned, served a tour in Thailand and now – newly promoted to captain, the youngest in the Army – he had just arrived at Fire Base Kate, not far from the Cambodian border. He commanded a force of some 150 U.S. Army Special Forces and

Montagnard soldiers (the Montagnards were the original people in what became Vietnam, he had explained) and he arrived to find his men playing cards and volleyball.

“Our perimeter was in sad shape,” Bill said. “We were not battle-ready.” No patrols had been deployed to scout what enemy forces might be in the area.

“Tomorrow we get this place battle-ready,” he told his men, and they settled into an uneasy sleep.

That night three North Vietnam Army brigades – some 6,000 soldiers – attacked the base because it blocked their route to where they had intended to launch a campaign to cut South Vietnam in half, Bill said.



Against those overwhelming forces, for the next several days Bill and the men under his command stopped the North Vietnamese offensive. Running low on ammunition, reinforcements, water and air cover, they

prepared to abandon their position under cover of darkness. They were alone; “Spooky” – the nickname for World War II-era C-47 aircraft outfitted with deadly accurate Gattling-type guns – broke down and did not arrive to cover their retreat.

At that point, Bill stopped his narrative and invited listeners to read what happened next in his recently published book, *Abandoned in Hell*. More than a few BRC members accepted that offer and purchased a copy.



During the Q&A at the end of his remarks, Bill was reunited with his adjutant from their days with the Army Reserve unit in the QC – our own **John Sherrick**, who praised Bill for his ability to lead soldiers in combat.

S.K. Nanda conducted the induction of **Gary Felton**, commander of the Quad Cities Salvation Army unit. Before coming to the QC some five years ago, Gary had served communities in several Midwestern states – he’s a native of Wisconsin and a fan of both the Packers and the Badgers – and one term in Kingston, Jamaica. He and his wife are parents of a son who is a dean at Tennessee State University.

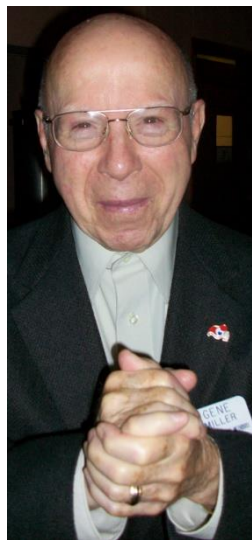
